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DISCIPLESHIP

Luke 24: 30-32 — When He [Jesus] was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them. Then their eyes were opened and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight. They asked each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?"

The Emmaus road story helps to illuminate Accompaniment, a theology of mission. We see that mission is a journey, and that this journey, taken with many companions, shows us the unexpected and sometimes unrecognized Christ who walks with us. In this journey, as we break bread together, we move toward Christ's mission of reconciliation between us and God, between us and one another. (Taken from the ELCA Accompaniment Manual)

Bishop Stacie Fidlar of the Northern Illinois Synod of the ELCA entrusted a small committee with the task to coordinate and promote visits from our Tanzanian friends during 2024. We were given the direction to reach as many congregations as possible and share the joys of walking in accompaniment with our partners in the North Central Diocese of Tanzania and the Arcot Lutheran Church in India. It was our hope that these opportunities to hear from our guests would reinvigorate current companion church relations and spark interest in making new connections.

All the Tanzanian presenters talked about the benefits of walking in companionship with one another. They shared personal experiences of the number of blessings received by all involved. Meals were shared, gifts were given and received, and prayers were lifted! Churches that had a companion parish were inspired to rejuvenate their relationship. Other churches were so excited they said, "yes, sign me up for a companion church!"

Daudi & Kellen Msseemmaa along with their two children, Shaddai & Solomon were back in the states to



meet with congregants, attend conferences, and spend time with family. Daudi preached at Shepherd in the Prairie (Huntley), Trinity (Moline), and St. John's (Peru). Daudi spoke at Salem

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JUSTICE

I recently visited my daughter and her family at their home in Higuillar, Dorado, Puerto Rico, outside of San German officer, against the failed coup and then Juan, the capital. The majority of the people where they live are Taino, (indigenous Caribbean), Black, and

Spanish. Their subdivision was built around the international school. Tasis, where my grandchildren now attend. They live in a bubble, as the neighborhood is a gated community and the people who live there are well off. There are few white people and few that speak only English. Puerto Rico does not have a defined middle class, just upper and lower. I

went out of the "bubble" and attended San Pedro Evangelical Lutheran Church, Toa Baia, on All Saints Sunday. I had the feeling of being out of my comfort zone, being that I did not understand a word of their Spanish service, and the neighborhood around the church seemed sketchy to me. There were about 10 people attending, mostly Women. I quickly translated the Lessons and Gospel readings, from Spanish to English on Goggle Translate, but I was dead in the water when the woman pastor gave her sermon. I knew that they should not accommodate just for me, and I had the stark realization that this is what immigrants, some of them my close friends, experience in our country, even though I was embraced by the very friendly pastor and its members. I could drive a short distance back to the bubble, where my family now stayed, but it left an impression on me of feeling unsafe and lonely. What if the members of the congregation did not embrace me? How would I have felt then?

My grandfather was a German WW1 officer in 1923. In January of that year, my mother was born. Hitler's Beer Hall Putsch, in Munich, took place in the fall of year. The Putsch brought Hitler to the attention of the German nation for the first time and generated front page headlines in newspapers around the world.

My grandfather witnessed the event and testified, as a found himself on a hit list. He immigrated late in 1923, with Wartburg Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa

> listed as his sponsor on his passport and the ship manifest that brought him to this country. He must have been scared out of his mind to leave, feeling lonely, unsafe, and overwhelmed, especially with my grandma and the four other children back in the country that he loved. He came to love this country as we do, but he taught his children and

grandchildren to be very afraid of the rise of Fascism and Authoritarianism again.

After the Fall Convention, we can now reflect on our keynote speaker's focus on Immigration, as well as our guests from Tanzania. How thrilling it was to be among people that we have developed relationships with, who can talk to us about their cultures from the other side of the world! We love to experience the humanity and love of children of God together. As Women of the ELCA, we, too, can choose civility when we find ourselves in uncomfortable conversations with friends and relatives divided on the outcome of the recent election results; arguing over whether there should be a separation of church and state. We can ground ourselves in God's love first and together work to end Christian Nationalism, which puts God in a small box, teaches racism, and has destroyed countless lives over many years. This form of Christian superiority has torn families apart and has diminished the humanity of us all. Time after time its, conspiracy message turns out to be unsustainable because God's love and way in our world will not tolerate this. I am grateful and proud that we Women continue to step out of our comfort zone to learn and protect immigrants of other cultures, religious freedoms, and the least among us. We can continue to do this.



The Convention was attended by 72 women who voted on and approved the new budget of \$22,650 for 2025/26 year and elected new officers to the Board.
