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#### **JUSTICE**

Zion Lutheran Church and Eliminate Racism 815 Rockford offered another Civil Rights trip this summer. I was one of 50 total who traveled by coach from June 20 – 25; first to Nashville Tennessee, then on to Atlanta, Georgia. Some adults were with their sons or daughters; there were 17 teens -- we were an intergenerational, interfaith, and mixed-race group, with pastors and interns.

Together, we learned a lot by immersing ourselves in antiracism education through courageous conversation; first with films shown on the bus as we drove along, which described the history of racism through interviews and documentaries and then to the historical museum sites where this history happened.

Our first stop on Friday was at the Jimmy Carter Presidential Library and Museum in Atlanta, to see his Nobel Peace Prize and Presidential Medal of Freedom. Next stop, Atlanta's new Civil Rights Museum in the city where Martin Luther King Jr. called his home, was amazing! This is a 42,000 square-foot facility devoted to the movement itself. Here, are King's personal papers, handwritten notes, and 1,100 books from his personal library. This museum links the Civil Rights Movement along with the ongoing struggles for human rights around the world, some of which are immigration, women's rights, protection for

those with disabilities, and gay, lesbian, and transgender issues. On Saturday, we toured Morehouse College, one of the four black colleges in Atlanta. Morehouse is the men's college, and Spelman is the women's. Ron Simmons had arranged this stop, as he had attended Clark College. Atlanta University is also there, and all the colleges are in cooperation with each other. Our tour guide, a junior student, led our group in speaking to the teens about college enrollment opportunities they might consider. I was impressed by our tour guide and asked if he would share his favorite class text from his last semester.

Zion Lutheran Church and Eliminate Racism 815 Rock- I ordered "Race, Law and American Society, 1607 to ford offered another Civil Rights trip this summer. I Present", by Gloria J. Browne-Marshall, on the spot, was one of 50 total who traveled by coach from June after his recommendation.

On Sunday, we attended service at Ebenezer Baptist, a massive new church. The message focused on the graduating students from the four colleges. Across the street is the original Ebenezer Baptist, where Dr. King Sr. and Dr. King Jr. preached. It was there that

we saw the bullet hole in the pew from when gunfire killed Martin Luther King's mother as she was directing the choir, along with several choir members. We stopped and shopped at Black Wall Street, an all-Black entrepreneur shopping experience.

Back in Nashville, we had the pleasure of experiencing the National Museum of African American Music. Many of us were educated on how slave songs evolved into spirituals. Jim Crow/Blackface sung by white entertainers, degraded Black music in front of white only audiences. Then, after the

Black music in front of white only audiences. Then, after the Civil Rights Movement, black artists' pop songs climbed the charts only later to be covered by white artists, bringing in more money for record companies. And the cycle continues.

This was tough discussion material of dark history that our country experienced, and which continues today. We are grateful to our friends of color on

this trip who were able to explain to us how racism has impacted their lives historically and presently. We can learn this together, as the only way to move forward is by looking back. For when God's children suffer, we all suffer. I am so blessed to have churches, synagogues, temples, and museums continue to remind us. We can do this!!

In the mail, I received a wonderful letter from ELCA World Hunger that highlighted a program in southern Los Angeles and how they are helping neighbors most vulnerable to hunger and poverty. I also received a letter from Global Refuge that spoke of a church in Pennsylvania that has ministered to refugees for 60 years. Also included in this letter was a personal note from Bishop Tim Smith from the North Carolina Synod, that had a moving personal story about a refugee from Afghanistan who was so inspired by the help he received from Global Refuge that he now works for this agency. How wonderful that ELCA World Hunger and Global Refuge are two of our offering designations for convention! Our third designation is AMMPARO (Accompanying Mi-

After reading these two letters, I went to my stewardship folder and reread some of the NIS WELCA resolutions that outline giving to several worthy programs throughout the world. These included Women's Fellowship Desk of the Arcot Lutheran Church in India, Women of the North Central Diocese in Tanzania, Our Savior's Lutheran Church on the Rocky Boy Indian Reservation in Montana, NIU Grace Place Campus Ministry, and our most recent resolution for Dollars for Daughters (note the photos below from Strong Girls 2 Women Camp that received a Dollars for Daughters Grant). The same day an email came from our Discipleship Advocate, Deb Quinn, with a flyer advertising the visits of Kellen and Daudi Msseemmaa and Pastor Seth Sululu from our companion synod in Tanzania. When I thought of all this in total, I just could not help but praise God for the work of the ELCA and Women of the ELCA. I pray that you will support these programs either in your congregation and/or individually and continue to pray for all the wonderful work that is done through our church.
