#### PRESIDENT REPORT



Our summer yard and garden upkeep has been curtailed and sidewalk snow and ice removal is challenging. It is great to walk outside with a partner, dog or human, and listen to the birds that still sing, while protecting their winterfeeding territories. Can you smell the wood smoke from someone's wood stove or fireplace? If it is a still night and the moon is full, we might catch the rare sight of the snow owl. After that walk, it feels great to curl up with a cup of warm cider and a book, where it's warm, or in my case in a warm car listening to one on Audible, during that long drive to and from. That being said, let's get together and share with each other for another Zoom book read!

al homeowners do not see or concern themselves with these issues because they are usually underground and the problem doesn't show itself until it becomes a costly and, many times, dangerous mess to fix during flooding or subzero weather.

Yes, the book that is necessary for us all to read is, "Waste, One Woman's Fight Against America's Dirty Secret," by Catherine Coleman Flowers. Broken sewer and septic systems become environmental, public health, and justice red flags. This book describes how the poor among us get trapped in this dirty underground secret. Together, we will discuss how economic gain threatens human rights, while social and racial justice gets pushed aside. Many of us dread the bill but we can usually afford to pay it. However, many others in this country are so heavily fined that their economic means make it impossible to get out of. Every-

one should have the right to clean water and safe sanitary conditions! Please watch for the Zoom Invite for this book soon.

Dr. Jennifer Harvey has written again! We worked with her book in the Fall of 2021, "Raising White Kids, In A Racially Unjust America." Her new book, "Anti-Racism as Daily Practice, Refuse Shame, Change White Communities, and Help Create a Just World," will come out this summer and can be pre-ordered. Dr. Harvey also recommends, "The Black Friend: On Being a Better White Person," by Frederick Joseph, and also the book, "Doing Nothing Is No Longer an Option: One Woman's Journey into Everyday Anti-racism," by Jenny Booth Potter. We can keep on reading and catch up with one another, one-on-one, through sharing these books. Let's do this!!

Immanuel, Yorkville sewed 100 quilts and packed 35 layettes, for Lutheran World Relief. The women served a salad buffet this past summer as a time to focus on gathering fabric for their quilting project. They also had a Thrivent member help secure funds.

<u>Plattville, Minooka</u> sent out 120 quilts, 99 school kits, 40 layettes, 4 sewed outfits, and 35 health kits to LWR. They made 30 dozen Kringle, with proceeds going to their Sun-
